## **Pros**

**Nights and Weekends Off:** Most providers work business hours with nights and weekends off.

## <u>Cons</u>

Lack of Benefits: Private daycare providers typically do not have access to established benefit packages.

**No Co-Workers:** Being the only adult with children can be isolating.

Late Pick-Ups: A parent late to pick up their child, extends the work day.

**Conduct Issues:** Some children have behavioral issues that require professional intervention.

**Provide Your Own Supplies:** Providers must furnish the supplies needed for their business.

**Late Payments:** Revenue can be effected when parents are late with payments.

No Breaks or Days Off: It is difficult to take time off for routine appointments or special occasions.

**Sharing Part of Your Home:** Having your business in your home results in wear and tear.

**Start-up Costs:** It can be expensive to purchase equipment to start a childcare business.

**Licensing Regulations:** Childcare providers must follow KDHE licensing regulations and inspections.
